Every Lent for the first scrutiny we listen to the word of God from the 4<sup>th</sup> chapter of John. The Gospel writer uses some very convincing language with the story of Jesus and the woman at the well.

He says, "whoever drinks the water I shall give will never thirst; we worship what we understand; you must worship in spirit and

truth." The words *never*, *understand*, and *truth* do not leave many options. At the beginning of the chapter, the woman seems timid. After Jesus speaks these powerful words and shares insights (*never*, *understand*, *truth*) she is transformed.

My original Cursillo weekend was a transforming experience, for which I am eternally grateful, and I would say that the most pivotal change was the ability to really open up my heart to God, and then to other people. A key factor was my introduction to the concept of what true piety is, instead of what I had perceived it to be. Most importantly, it was stressed that piety is natural, and that God does not ask, or want us to stop being who we are, but to use what we are to bring Him and his Love to others. Your piety should fit your life-style, and you should do what's natural to you; but at the same time, continue to challenge yourself to improve and to grow. You are unique, and your relationship with God is unique. And, you shouldn't compare yours to others'; no matter how inspirational they are.

Now, while one side of piety requires action to make it authentic, the other aspect

requires the need to just be STILL, to LISTEN, and to just BE. And, how difficult that is for us sometimes. Are we able to go to our center and open our hearts to God? Can we trust Him enough to give Him all of us – open our whole heart to Him and let Him love us for that – not for words, not for works? Can we be humble enough to let this be enough? Afterall, if we are always talking, anticipating, and doing, how do we have any ability to listen and enjoy God's presence with us, and in us, now? And, until you are able to accept the unconditional love of God into your heart for yourself, you are incapable of giving it to others.

Oftentimes what I find helpful is to go to a quiet area like a chapel, or a cozy corner in my own home, and just sit and BE with God; to just be STILL and to LISTEN. I find a connection that nourishes everything else. I just try and make sure that it is what feels right and not a "have to" activity. I try and remain open to what feels like it will truly bring me closer to the Father at that particular time.

I am frustrated that my group strays from the group reunion sheet. Is it important to stick to the sheet?

Dear Grumpy Groupie,

It is absolutely important to stick to the group reunion sheet. Though the group reunion should be based on true friendship and trust, it is formed to allow weekly Christian sharing. The purpose of the group reunion sheet is to keep our reunions structured so that Christ is always at the center of our conversation. We are sharing how Christ works in our lives. Sharing things not centered in Christ causes the group to be no different than any other social circle. The group reunion is only valid if the members share the three fundamental elements of piety, study and action. In piety, we share the aids that help us to stay in contact with Christ. In study, we share what has helped us to know Christ better and to understand better His will for us. In action, we share how we have evangelized our environments—home, work and community—during the past week. The group reunion members support each other by sharing not only successes, but failures. We rely on our groupies to help us up when we fall, to encourage us to keep going through sharing, prayer and palanca. Our apostolic plan for action becomes a real commitment when we share it with our groupies. The members of the group reunion should share a common desire to grow in personal conversion. When the group functions properly, the result is that we are helping each other to live out our Baptismal and Confirmation call. We are helping each other effect an apostolic transformation simply by living as authentic disciples of Christ.
